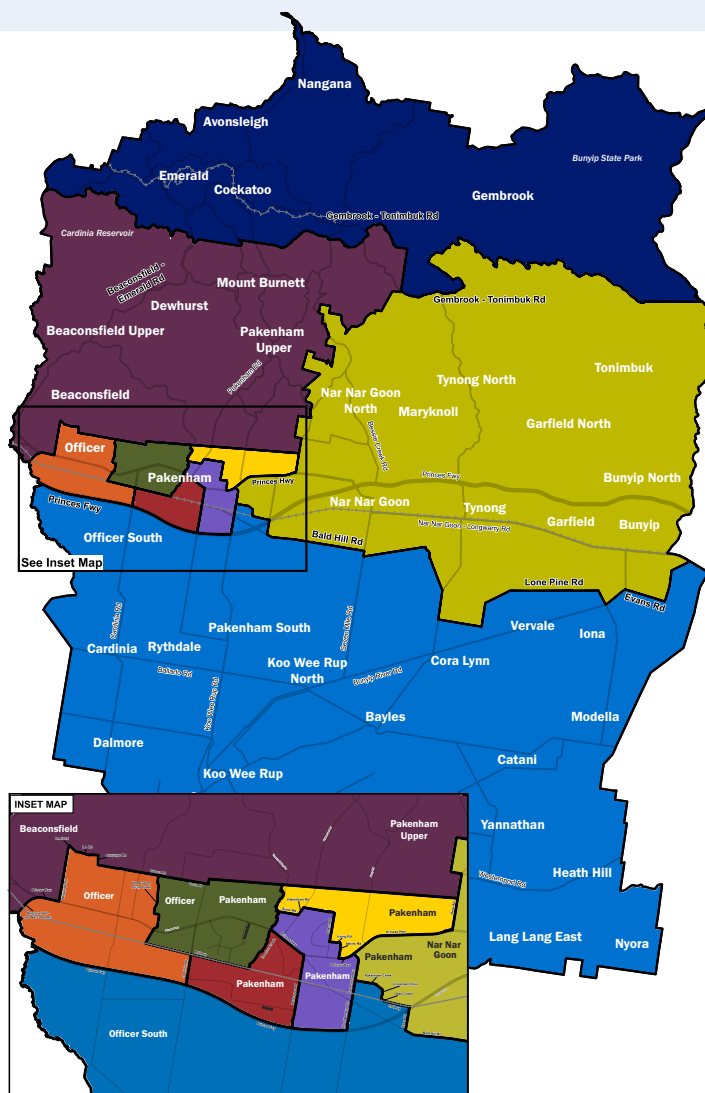

Mayor's Message

Reflecting on the first 6 months of the new Council term, I'm filled with a sense of accomplishment, pride and intention. The new Council group, which includes three returning councillors, five new faces and a returning former councillor, has hit the ground running with a number of key projects and strategies underway. Our focus is to work together for the benefit of our community and to ensure our shire remains a great place to call home.

Work has commenced to develop our new Council Plan and associated strategic documents. We're inviting community feedback on the strategic objectives, which will guide the development of the new plans. Thank you to members of our Community Panel for their valuable input and insights as part of the deliberative engagement process in February. Community input is so important in helping us to shape the future of our shire. Find out how you can become involved on pages 4–5.

We've developed our first annual draft budget of the new Council term, with a focus on balancing our response to financial challenges while prioritising existing services and infrastructure to support community needs. We've worked hard to balance the delivery of Council services and projects while

recognising the ongoing cost of living pressures facing our community. We're budgeting for a \$3.2 million adjusted underlying deficit, which is down from this year's current forecast of \$7.5 million, and reflects our commitment to responsible financial management. You can provide feedback on the draft budget until 9 May. See page 5.

Advocacy has been a major focus over the past couple of months, with Council endorsing our key advocacy priorities and launching our Federal election advocacy campaign. We're seeking funding and support to address a number of critical needs across the shire – the Princes Highway intersection upgrades from Nar Nar Goon to Longwarry, Cardinia Life redevelopment, road sealing package and the Lang Lang sand truck bypass. Our campaign aims to amplify our community's voice and seek support for the projects that matter to you. Turn to pages 8–9 to learn more.

It's been great getting out and about with my fellow Councillors across the shire for my regular Meet the Mayor sessions. We've heard what's important to you, answered questions and enjoyed a chat! Keep an eye on my Facebook page and Council's website for details of upcoming sessions.

Looking to the future



Have Your Say

Community input is essential in helping to guide Council in planning for the future of our shire.

That's why we're inviting you to provide feedback on Council's draft strategic objectives, which will guide the development of the new Council Plan 2025–29 and other key plans.

You may be wondering what a strategic objective is – these are goals that Council will work towards achieving over the next 4 years during the life of the new Council Plan.

These objectives, or goals, have been informed by priorities that the Community Panel identified during the deliberative engagement process in February.

The Community Panel, which was made up of residents from across the shire, shared ideas and valuable insights over four workshops as part of the deliberative engagement process. The panel reviewed and updated Council's Community Vision and identified a number of key focus areas that have helped to inform the draft strategic objectives.

Now it's time for you to tell us what you think of the draft strategic objectives.



Thriving communities: we deliver inclusive programs and facilities that enhance engagement, wellbeing and resilience.



Vibrant places: we celebrate our well-designed towns and infrastructure that strengthens belonging and connection.



Adaptive environments: we care for our natural environment and support recovery from challenges.



Prosperous economies: we encourage urban and rural business and local employment to grow.



Responsible leaders: we demonstrate responsible leadership and financial stewardship.

The new Council Plan and other key plans will ultimately guide Council's activities and decision making for the next 4 years, so it's important that we develop plans that reflect the community's priorities and that will enable us to respond to our rapid growth and challenges, and ensure that our shire remains a vibrant and liveable place that people are proud to call home.

What's next?

Following the consultation period, the finalised strategic objectives will inform the development of the Council Plan 2025–29, the Long Term Financial Plan, Asset Plan and Liveability Plan. Each plan will go out for wider community engagement later in the year.

Community Vision 2040

One of the key roles of the Community Panel was to review and update the Community Vision 2040. The new vision below has been endorsed by Council:

“We acknowledge that we are on the traditional land of the Bunurong and Wurundjeri people.

“We understand, value and incorporate these contributions, past and present. We empower everyone to have a voice. We speak with the optimism and insight of our people, the energy of our community members and the wisdom of all those that came before us.

“We support all people of Cardinia so that they are strong, resilient, safe, socially connected and physically and mentally well. We do this by strengthening community cohesion through engagement and advocacy.

“We care for our country. We take preventative and mitigative actions on climate change in our community, environment, and the planet in everything we do.

“We are sustainable in the way we live, we work close to home, we grow food and we make valuable contributions to the nation. We protect our community, farms, industries, landscapes and biodiversity to ensure they are resilient.

“We provide fit for purpose infrastructure and services that cater for the growth of the community. Growth will be managed prudently and sustainably so that it enables our progress towards community priorities.

“Through advocacy and community engagement, the infrastructure, local community and healthcare services are in place to meet our needs.”

Draft Budget 2025–26

Cardinia Shire Council's Draft Budget 2025–26 is available for community feedback until 9 May.

The draft budget is the first budget of the new Council term and highlights how Council proposes to fund its investment in services, projects and programs over the next four years.

The draft budget strives to reflect the key priorities identified by the Community Panel as part of the deliberative engagement process for the development of our new Council Plan 2025–29.

We've worked hard to balance our response to financial challenges while prioritising existing services and infrastructure to support community needs.

Council has also developed the draft Revenue and Rating Plan 2025–29, which determines the most appropriate and affordable revenue and rating approach for Council over the next 4 years and sets guidelines for use in developing Council's Budget, Financial Plan and other strategic planning documents.

Our brand-new 10-hectare regional park, perched on the scenic hilltop along Lansell Avenue, is now open.

Epic multi-level playgrounds

Have you seen our rainbow adventure playground and the impressive two 20-metre-long embankment slides running down Lansell Avenue?

Our new park features an incredible playground with various play zones and experiences, which have been designed to entertain everyone from young children to adventurous adults, guaranteeing fun for all ages.

Parkour

Officer District Park is home to Cardinia Shire's first purpose-built Parkour Zone, including a mix of obstacles of different heights, angles, and shapes. Parkour equipment is designed to be traversed in a fluid motion, running, climbing, leaping and balancing between obstacles.

Fitness facilities

Looking for a new place to get some exercise and fresh air? Look no further than Officer District Park! Complete with fitness running stairs, a 1km loop track around the hillside and two exercise equipment stations, the park is an ideal spot for fitness enthusiasts to visit.

Scenic lookout and picnic facilities

At the top of the hillside, a lookout offers breathtaking views over the southern part of the shire and out to Western Port, providing a perfect spot for relaxation and appreciation of the natural surroundings. Picnic facilities, including tables, seating, barbecues and shading are located closer to the central plaza area.

Dog off-leash area

Let your furry friends run free in our dedicated off-leash area, designed for fun and social interaction. The space

includes a larger off-leash area for all dogs to enjoy which includes agility equipment and seating, and there is also a smaller enclosed space for smaller dogs to feel safe to explore.

Dog owners are reminded to always maintain control of their dogs, while visiting off-leash areas. All dog owners must be able to recall their dog promptly and place it back on a leash if required.

Parking and public toilets are available onsite. A permanent unique two-level restroom facility is under construction and will service the split-level design of the play spaces.

Reimagining Pakenham

Pakenham Revitalisation is a long-term priority project which aims to reimagine the future look and feel of the heart of Pakenham.

We are committed to finding new ways to make Pakenham an active and vibrant community town centre, and we have been taking time to review and consider the best ways to deliver streetscape upgrades in the community's best interest.

Through the proposed upgrades, we are aiming to improve accessibility, community safety, connectivity, boost the local economy and create an attractive environment that can host a range of events and activities.

Council remains committed to delivering the Pakenham Revitalisation project over the next decade, and we are still looking forward to delivering vital upgrades and reimagining Pakenham as a place for people.

We are hoping to share an exciting update with the community shortly about our proposed plans for this project!



Cardinia Calls For...



Cardinia Shire Council is calling for investment and support to help our community thrive.

We're working hard to advocate for what our community needs.

Council is seeking investment from all levels of government for essential infrastructure and services to support our rapidly growing community's needs, now and into the future.

At the centre of our advocacy campaign are four critical projects that our community deserves.

Princes Highway intersection upgrades

The need

The intersections along Princes Highway between Nar Nar Goon and Longwarry are known for near misses and accidents. There are no slip lanes or overpasses, forcing vehicles entering the highway to pull out in front of oncoming traffic. Since 2017, there have been more than 115 road accidents along this 30km stretch of road, including four fatalities.

The ask

Council is seeking \$25 million to develop a business case for construction of four grade separated interchanges along the Princes Highway between Nar Nar Goon and Longwarry.

The plan

If supported, Council would partner with other levels of government to deliver a business case and masterplan that outlines the safest and most effective solutions to the current intersections linking Nar Nar Goon, Tynong, Garfield, Bunyip and Longwarry to the Princes Highway. These plans will then be used to deliver the new interchanges with the support of the Australian and Victorian governments.

Community benefit

These critical intersection upgrades will enhance road safety for community members and visitors to the shire, and will improve access to the townships of Tynong, Garfield and Bunyip. These towns are also significant tourist destinations, with many people travelling from Melbourne to visit Gippsland.



Cardinia Life redevelopment

The need

Since Cardinia Life opened in 2006, the shire's population has more than doubled and it is expected to grow by another 40,000 over the next 10 years. This ageing facility has been unable to keep up with demand, with community members missing out on swim classes, community sport and leisure activities.

The ask

Council is calling for \$28.54 million from both the Australian and Victorian governments to commence Stage 1 of the Cardinia Life redevelopment, providing modern sports and aquatic facilities in the heart of Cardinia Shire.

The plan

If funded, Council would deliver a total refurbishment of Cardinia Life in three stages, improving and expanding on aquatic, sporting, and community facilities, including new aquatic facilities, additional sports courts (bringing the total to 12), expanded gym, leisure and wellness opportunities, and better community facilities.

Community benefit

A redeveloped Cardinia Life will benefit residents of all ages and abilities from right across the shire, as well as provide opportunities for people to stay healthy and active, and help to build connection within the community.

The redeveloped centre will be future-proofed to cater to population growth, to meet our community's needs now and into the future.



Road sealing package

The need

Cardinia Shire's hills communities are home to an extensive network of unsealed roads that present significant safety, maintenance and amenity issues across the region. Our community has been asking for safe, reliable roads in this part of the shire to ensure emergency services have access during times of emergency such as bushfires and storms. The former Federal Government committed \$150 million over 10 years to seal roads in the northern region of the shire through the 'Sealing the Hills' program. Following the change of government, only \$41 million has been provided.

The ask

Council is seeking \$109 million to seal roads in emergency-prone areas in the northern region of the shire, to improve access and safety during natural disasters.

The plan

If funding is reinstated, Council would upgrade and seal hundreds of kilometres of roads across the Dandenong Ranges, including in Emerald, Cockatoo, Gembrook, and the surrounding towns.

Community benefit

Sealing additional roads in this area will not only improve access and safety, but it will also mean that residents no longer have to deal with regular potholes, road surface issues and dust. The roads will also be safer and more reliable in emergency situations.

Sealing the extensive road network in the hills will dramatically reduce ongoing maintenance costs and will free up Council funds for investment in other much needed community services and projects that benefit people right across the shire.



Lang Lang bypass

The need

Sand extraction is a major industry in Lang Lang and the Victorian Government is actively encouraging the expansion of existing quarries. Lang Lang sand is essential to the building industry, but trucks must pass through the main streets of Lang Lang to reach the rest of Melbourne.

Analysis by Council has revealed that truck traffic through Lang Lang town centre has increased significantly in recent years. The latest data shows that more than 80 trucks an hour travel through the main shopping strip in Lang Lang on weekdays – this is an average of one truck every 45 seconds.

The ask

Council is seeking \$24 million from the Australian and Victorian governments to construct the new bypass road, which will divert large trucks from the Lang Lang town centre and provide an alternative route that connects quarries directly to the South Gippsland Highway.

The plan

If funded, Council would construct a dedicated bypass for trucks travelling from sand quarries in Lang Lang towards the South Gippsland Highway, removing them from local roads and Lang Lang's main streets.

Community benefit

A bypass would improve traffic flow for quarry trucks and other heavy vehicles travelling through Lang Lang and future-proof the area by accommodating more trucks with larger loads. Most importantly, a bypass would improve safety and amenity. The quarries are a significant source of local jobs in the region, and the bypass will support the local economy and encourage growth in this industry without compromising the liveability of Lang Lang.

New bowls and community hub for Koo Wee Rup

The Koo Wee Rup community has celebrated the opening of the new state-of-the-art bowls and community hub.


The modern, modular build features social, lounge and community rooms, separate kitchen and office spaces, first aid room, change rooms, toilet amenities and a large, decked area and spectator seating. A new car park and access paths have also been completed.

Westernport Ward Councillor Cr Trudi Paton said she was pleased the project was now complete.

"The new community rooms provide marvellous meeting and activity spaces for Koo Wee Rup's active community groups," Cr Paton said.

"Combined with the bright, modern and well fitted social spaces, this new building puts Koo Wee Rup on the map as a classy event space and Koo Wee Rup's Bowls President, Tim, will be keen to hear from anyone looking to hire it."

As part of the redevelopment project, a community room in the new facility has been dedicated in the memory of former Westernport Ward Councillor, the late Ray Brown, who played a pivotal role in securing funding for the project. The project was jointly funded by Council, Victorian Government's Growing Suburbs Fund and the Federal Government's Building Better Regions Fund.

Officer town centre



Cardinia Shire Mayor Cr Jack Kowarzik and Officer Ward Cr Samantha-Jane Potter look to the future for Officer town centre.

Council remains committed to working with landowners and the Victorian Government to progress development of the Officer town centre.

The town centre will be developed in line with the Precinct Structure Plan (PSP) and will accommodate multiple uses, including retail, commercial and office use, supermarkets and shops, hospitality and entertainment activities, health and government services, and higher density housing such as town houses and apartments.

Council is responsible for assessing and issuing planning permits, and providing assistance and guidance on meeting the relevant planning requirements. However, Council cannot progress development on behalf of private or State Government landowners.

Cardinia Shire Mayor Cr Jack Kowarzik said development of the town centre was reliant on landowners choosing to develop their land.

“Unfortunately, Council cannot influence the timing of development in Officer town centre, as landowners have the right to decide when to develop their land.

“Council issues planning permits for development, however, this doesn’t necessarily guarantee development commences. The permit holder decides when they will progress with their

development and use of the site. Often, this decision can be impacted by various commercial and market factors.”

Officer Ward Councillor Samantha-Jane Potter said she looked forward to further development of the town centre.

“The ambition for Officer town centre is to create a diverse and vibrant space that accommodates multiple uses,” Cr Potter said.

“Whilst Council is unable to make planning decisions on behalf of landowners, Council officers are available to support and assist landowners as development progresses.”

Council has issued a permit for a site in Officer north of the highway for a mixed-use commercial development including a supermarket, offices and other retailers. Council is also currently working with another major retailer to progress a planning permit application for a site in Siding Avenue. We will share more information when it becomes publicly available.

Council’s Planning and Economic Development teams are frequently meeting with developers, investors and businesses to promote opportunities in Officer Town Centre.



Jobs boost

The Officer South Employment Precinct Structure Plan has been approved.

The Minister for Planning has approved the Officer South Employment Precinct Structure Plan and Infrastructure Contributions Plan under Amendment C274, which is incorporated into the Cardinia Planning Scheme.

The precinct will offer a dedicated hub for employment separate from residential areas, providing ample space for industries requiring larger lots and buffer distances from sensitive uses. With convenient access to infrastructure, nearby services, and freight connections, the precinct is designed to attract a diverse range of innovative industrial, manufacturing, warehousing, and commercial operations. Officer South sets a new standard for future employment precincts in the shire.

This State Significant Employment Precinct will generate abundant employment opportunities, with approximately 22,000 diverse new jobs created closer to emerging communities in Cardinia Shire. The precinct will also feature a well-designed and sustainable residential neighbourhood for around 5,000 residents to support living and working locally. The plan also aims to enhance local biodiversity with more than 330 hectares of open space and a focus on the protection of Cardinia Creek and Lower Gum Scrub Creek.

The approval of the Officer South Employment Precinct Structure Plan and subsequent Infrastructure Contributions Plan further strengthen the Council’s advocacy efforts in calling for the extension of Thompsons Road to connect Berwick-Cranbourne Road in Clyde with Koo Wee Rup Road in Pakenham.

Report dumped rubbish

The community is encouraged to report dumped rubbish on Council-owned land to Cardinia Shire Council.

Council investigates all cases of dumped rubbish on council-owned land and has CCTV cameras at rubbish dumping hotspots.

Dumped rubbish ends up in our streets, parks and waterways, impacting on our environment and community health. In 2023–24, it cost Council more than \$300,000 to manage and remove dumped rubbish in the shire.

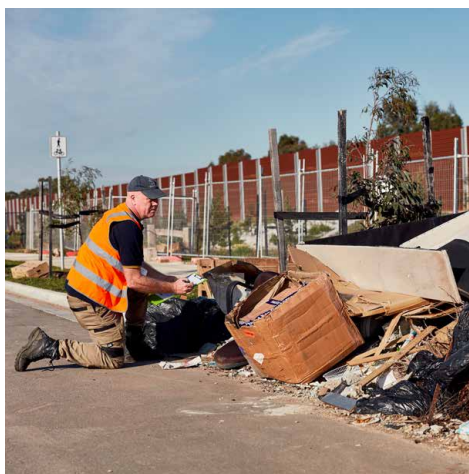
When reporting dumped rubbish to Council, having as much detail as possible helps the investigation. Council values community safety and asks that community members do not approach anyone dumping rubbish or touch dumped rubbish.

The amphitheatre and new stage at Alma Treloar Reserve in Cockatoo is now open.

The amphitheatre and stage have been upgraded to increase participation and inclusion of people with disability by enhancing access and reducing barriers. Other works include a new shade sail, picnic and barbecue area, drinking fountain, accessible ramps, seating, tables and landscaping.

Ranges Ward Councillor David Nickell said he was pleased to see the project completed.

“It’s great to see this project delivered for the Cockatoo community, and no doubt the community is looking forward to a range of community events, performances and concerts being hosted at the new amphitheatre,” Cr Nickell said.

Works have been completed as part of the Alma Treloar Reserve Masterplan and have been funded by Cardinia Shire Council, the Victorian Government’s Growing Suburbs Fund and the Federal Government’s Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Fund. Car park works have also been completed.

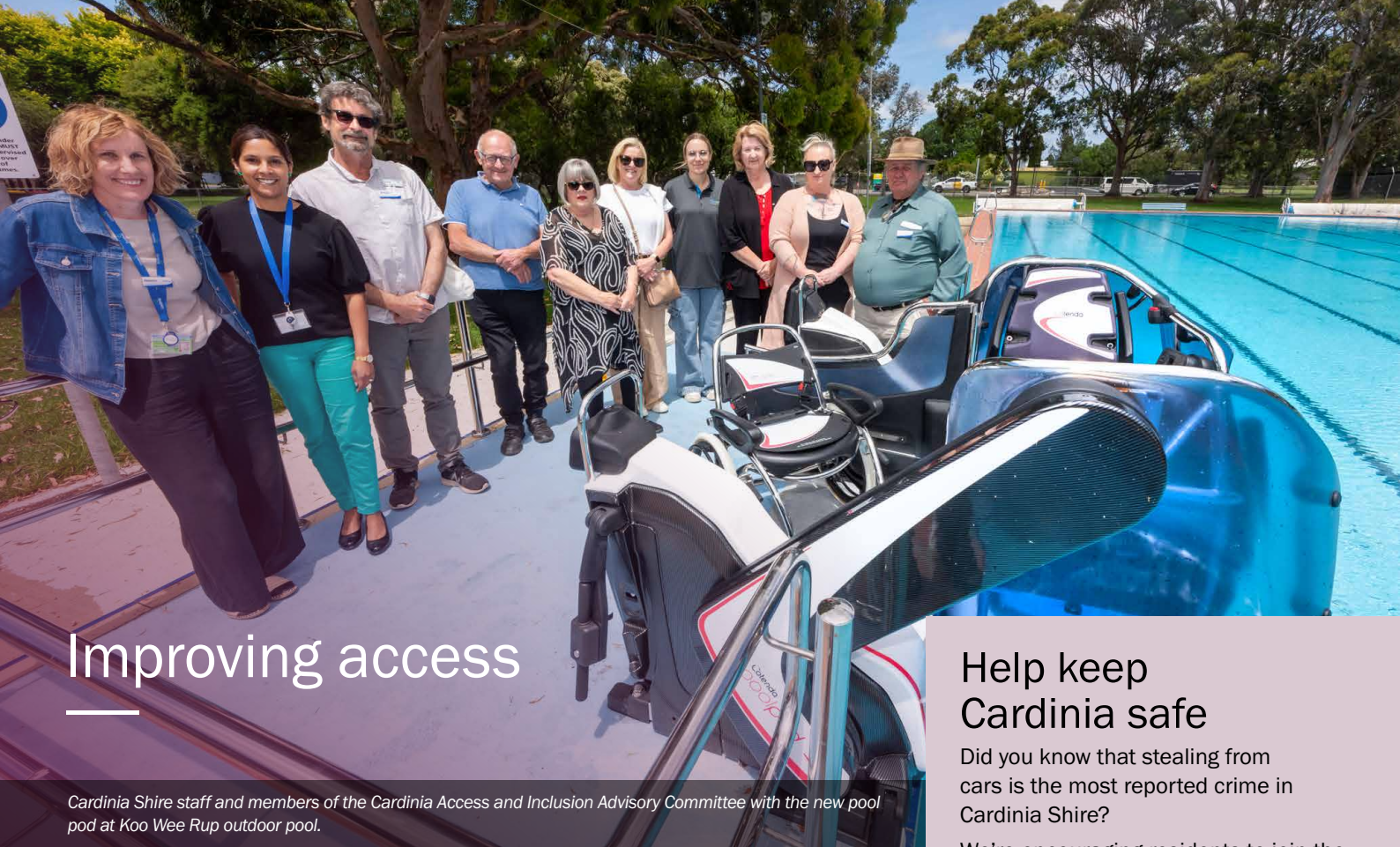
New kinder coming to Lang Lang

As part of the Building Blocks Partnership, the Victorian Government is contributing \$3 million to build the new Lang Lang Kindergarten on a Council-owned site in Oxford Street.

The new kindergarten will feature two kindergarten rooms, allowing us to provide a total of 118 kinder places for local families, as well as a consulting room, outdoor play space and off-street car parking.
